To define: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Who we are</li><li>• The Profession</li><li>• The ideology</li><li>• The time</li><li>• Quantity</li></ul>	Location
After the preposition de to express: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Origin</li><li>• Material</li></ul>	Progressive Action Estar + Past Participle
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• With adjectives to define subjects</li></ul>	With adjectives to express changing states

# Adjectives that change meaning with Ser and Estar

Adjectives that change Meaning		
Bueno/a	Good, good character, useful	That is in good health/ It has good flavor
Malo/a	Bad, nocive	That is in bad health/ It has bad flavor
Joven	Few years	That appears younger than it really is
Viejo/a	Many Years	That appears older than it really is
Nuevo/a	Few time or use	Looks new or unused
Listo/a	That is very intelligent	It is prepared
Atento/	Very educated	That pays attention
Orgullosa/a	Stuck up, conceited	That is happy and prideful
Abierto/a	The opposite of shy	The opposite of closed
Rico/a	That has a lot of money	That tastes good
